# UA System & UAFS Approach to Legislative Affairs in the State of Arkansas

- UA System Role
  - Represent Higher Education with the Legislature
  - Interpret New Laws
  - Create New Policies and Procedures
- My Role as Legislative Liaison
  - Communicate
  - Inform
  - Ensure Compliance



#### State of Arkansas Legislative Overview


- The General Assembly consists of the House of Representatives (100) and the Senate (35)
- Regular Sessions take place in odd numbered years
- Fiscal Sessions take place in even numbered years
- Special Sessions may be called by the governor to consider only those matters recommended by the governor.
- Appropriations (permission to spend):
  - Specifically appropriate money
  - Distinctly state the purposes of the appropriation
  - Express the maximum amount which may be drawn in dollars and cents
  - Limit the appropriations to no more than one (1) year

#### **Pre-Submitted Question #1**

This is a question regarding the laws against the use of certain words/phrases by State of AR employees -- a) Can you please explain the step-by-step actions that would be taken against a faculty who is recorded by a student accidentally using one of the banned words/phrases in class? b) Can you please explain the step-by-step actions that would be taken against a faculty who is caught by a student, a supervisor, or a faculty peer-reviewer accidentally using one of the banned words/phrases in video or written materials created by the faculty for students in an in-person or on-line class? c) Can you please explain the step-bystep actions that would be taken against a faculty who is caught by a student, a supervisor, or a faculty peer-reviewer unintentionally using one of the banned words/phrases in video or written materials created by someone other than the faculty member (such as a textbook, video, or other materials) for students in an in-person or on-line class?



## Act 797 – Prohibit Using the Term "West Bank" in Government Materials

Prohibits institutions from using the term "West Bank" to refer to Judea and Samaria in any official government material including a guidance, rule, material, briefing, press release, or communication prepared by the institution.

- Does include Syllabi according to the UA System General Counsel

#### **Pre-Submitted Question #2**

This is a question regarding the restructuring of the General Education and the DEI-related courses -- a) Will this restructuring, in addition to the move away from DEI and the budgetary issues lead to discontinuation of minors, such as the Diversity Studies Minor and/or classes, such as the race, gender, or inequality classes in the Sociology Minor? b) If the answer to Qa is yes, will this lead to faculty layoffs? c) If the answer to Qb is yes, will UAFS honor the 2year or 3-year contracts, or will faculty be laid-off immediately or at the end of the school-year of the lay-off decision?

#### **P** Common Sense

Create free, unbiased higher education learning settings.

- Stop using DEI as a metric in accreditation standards.
- Prohibit professors from indoctrinating students with forced statements in support of DEI.
- Prevent institutions from granting excused absences for protests and other disruptive behavior.
- Require students who vandalize school property to pay damages before they earn their degree.
- Allow institutions of higher education that support service members and military families to earn "Purple Star Campus" designations.
- Consider professors' work evaluations in tenure review to ensure they are educating students.

## Act 566 – Strengthening Arkansas Education Act (Core Curriculum)

Requires state-supported institutions of higher education to implement a 15-semester credit-hour general education requisite core curriculum for all undergraduate students.

- Effective August 5, 2025, but applies to the entering class of fall 2027 and beyond
- American Government & American History are required for every student.
- Update <u>General Education Core Requirements</u>
- Increase Demand for Specifically Qualified Professors
- Budget Impact
- Potential Space & Staffing Impacts
