I. Course Information

A. Catalog Description

Overview of scientific crime detection and detailed discussion of techniques for case management and documentation, the concept of proof, the impact of emergent technology on the investigative process, interacting with victims and witnesses, and interviewing suspects. Emphasis on the investigation of particular types of crimes; for example, homicides, sex offenses, child abuse, hate crimes, and so forth.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Appraise the fundamentals of criminal investigation, including crime scene analysis, documentation and compiling reports.
- 2. Discuss suspect identification processes.
- 3. Explain differences between interrogation and interview of suspects and witnesses.
- 4. Assess what laboratory services are available and distinguish how to submit evidence for analysis.
- 5. Determine legal issues that impact criminal investigations, including court rulings.
- 6. Describe intelligence, surveillance, and undercover operations.
- 7. Compare and contrast the investigative methods for specific types of crimes against persons, property crimes, drug and gang related crimes.
- 8. Describe the prosecutorial and court process.
