I. Course Information

A. Catalog Description

Study of the basic characteristics of language and its use and variations in society.

B. Additional Information

This course surveys topics in the study of language related to its use in society, including how it is used differentially according to the gender, age, ethnicity, and nationality of the speaker, and depending on the context, genre, level of formality and medium of communication.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify features of language and possible variations
- 2. Recognize social and contextual factors that influence variations in language form and language use
- 3. Report on observed variations in language form and language use
- 4. Interpret observations based on knowledge of social and contextual factors that influence language form and use
- 5. Examine language form and use in a specific area related to class topics

Students will reflect upon cultural differences and their implications for interacting with people from cultures other than their own. Students will develop in this area by discussing, either orally or in writing, global and cultural perspectives related to course topics.
