#### I. Course Information

# A. Catalog Description

Examines the countries of the world, focusing on regional geographical factors which have influenced the direction and extent of their development. (ACTS: GEOG 2103)

#### B. Additional Information

World Regional Geography students examine differences and similarities of societies in less developed and more developed regions of the world. Physical geography, demographic transitions, and recent economic trends in the regions are lecture areas and points of discussion for the class. A major investigative theme for the course is the interconnectedness of the peoples of the world. Map exercises to locate landforms and cultural landscapes, and thereby improve mental mapping skills, are part of the course. Writing a term paper is optional with the student.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Discuss the role geographical factors play in agricultural and industrial development.
- 2. Use the global grid, topographical maps, and demographic statistics.
