I. Course Information

A. Catalog Description

The origins of the American Civil War, its course, and subsequent efforts at reconciling the North and South. Emphasis on the social, economic, and cultural background to the war and its impact on American society.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Evaluate the historical significance of ideas, concepts, individuals, and events in the history of the United States from 1848 to 1877.
- 2. Define the concept of Manifest Destiny and evaluate its impact on the development of the United States, as well as Mexico and Native American tribes.
- 3. Describe the institution of slavery.
- 4. Identify the political aspects of the slavery issue.
- 5. Describe the impact of greater foreign immigration to the United States.
- 6. Describe the coming of and the fighting of the Civil War.
- 7. Analyze the process of Reconstruction, including the conditions and opportunities of the freedmen.
- 8. Use tools of historical analysis to complete research projects about American history, society, and culture during the period of American Civil War and Reconstruction.
- 9. Describe and explain the complexity of both change and continuity over time in American society and culture.

Students will examine how events and ideas in American society, culture, and government evolved during the period from 1848 to 1877, as well as to determine the contributions of Americans of this period to modern American society.
