#### I. Course Information

### A. Catalog Description

The study of Russia from Alexander II through the rise and eventual collapse of the Soviet Union.

#### **B.** Additional Information

This course represents an effort by the History Department to broaden the number of offerings in European History and is especially significant in light of the ongoing intensity of U.S./Russian foreign relations in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

### **II.** Student Learning Outcomes

### A. Subject Matter

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify the major tsarist reforms and reactions of the late 19<sup>th</sup> century.
- 2. Identify the key political and cultural figures in the development of Russia at the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.
- 3. Describe the revolutionary movements in Russia beginning in 1905.
- 4. Describe and analyze the important differences between Russia and other European powers, from World War I to World War II.
- 5. Evaluate the development of political institutions, economic philosophy, and communist society in Russia during the postwar period.

6. Interpret the reasons why Russian communism failed and how it left an impact on the world today.

By exploring social, cultural, political, and economic factors, students will be able to demonstrate understanding of the interaction between the United States and other nations.
