A. Catalog Description

Survey of the development and progression of Native American policy by the government and people of the United States from 1783 to the present.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Explain the development of various Native American policies established and frequently changed by the demands of the American people and the national government.
- 2. Analyze the impact on tribal people through the making of over 300 treaties, and the subsequent breaking of those treaties by the U.S. government.
- 3. Examine the decline of Native American cultures caused by war, forced removal, trade policies, and corruption of government Indian programs into the 20th century.
