I. Course Information

A. Catalog Description

Explores the art of film and the expression of societal values through the medium of film. Film techniques, major directors of film, historical genres, and significant works will be studied and analyzed. Major American films will be the primary focus, although some films from abroad may be included.

B. Additional Information

Because of limited class viewing time, students will be required to subscribe to Netflix or another commercial rental company in order to obtain copies of the films for viewing. A schedule of required films will be provided at the beginning of the semester. This course will satisfy the 3 credit hour fine arts elective of the General Education requirements.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify and explain the major film techniques, stressing the artistic and stylistic effects achieved.
- 2. Analyze how the values of a society are reflected in film and also influenced by film.
- 3. Identify selected major directors and analyze a major work by each director.
- 4. Identify the major genres and analyze a selected example of each genre.
- 5. Identify the stages in the historical development of film, the major films of each stage or era, and the interrelationship of the films with society
- 6. Analyze a film produced abroad and compare it to films produced in America.
