I. Course Information

A. Catalog Description

Designed to explore the characteristics of a diverse population to better promote understanding of patients, patient's families and professional peers. Value systems, cultural and ethnic influences, communication styles, socioeconomic influences, and health risks are explored in depth. An understanding of the factors that influence patient and peer interrelationships and insight into human diversity will assist the imaging professional in providing better patient care and departmental effectiveness.

B. Additional Information

This is a required course for all majors in Imaging Sciences (Leadership and Sonography).

II. Student Learning Outcomes

A. Subject Matter

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Discuss the critical need for cultural and linguistic competence.
- 2. Explain the factors involved in the cultural phenomena affecting health and healthcare.
- 3. Explain the meanings of terms related to immigration, such as citizen, refugee, legal permanent resident and naturalization.
- 4. Understand the subjective and objective determinants of health and illness.
- 5. Describe the factors that constitute traditional epidemiology.
- 6. Differentiate rituals of birth and death among people of selected faith traditions.
- 7. Discuss the professional socialization of nurses, physicians, and other members of the healthcare delivery system.
- 8. Compare and contrast modern medical care and cultural care.

- 9. Discuss the historical and demographic backgrounds of the American Indian and Alaska native population.
- 10. Discuss the historical and demographic backgrounds of the Asian American population.
- 11. Discuss the historical and demographic backgrounds of the Black or African American population.
- 12. Discuss the historical and demographic backgrounds of the Hispanic American population.
- 13. Discuss the historical and demographic backgrounds of selected populations with the White non-Hispanic population.
- 14. Describe the components of the cultural care circle.
- 15. Develop goals for integrating cultural competency into the scope of practice.
