I. Course Information

A. Catalog Description

Intensive study of testate and intestate inheritance, with special focus on the laws of Arkansas and Oklahoma. Emphasis is placed on the acquisition of knowledge and skills. Techniques for fact gathering, inheritance and estate tax principles, use of trusts, drafting and probate procedures will be covered.

II. Student Learning Outcomes

A. Subject Matter

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. List the order in intestate inheritance.
- 2. Identify the property in dower, curtsey, and homestead with or without children.
- 3. Distinguish ownership rights between joint tenancy, tenancy by the entireties and tenancy in common.
- 4. List the stages in a probate proceeding and distinguish the differences between intestate and testate.
- 5. Given a series of relevant cases, brief into component parts.
- 6. Given the resources of the law library, locate relevant statutes related to trust, probate and guardianship law.
- 7. Given a hypothetical client, conduct a fact gathering interview.
- 8. Given a set of statutes and form books, draft a will, a codicil, and a simple trust.

9. Given the resources of a form book, draft other documents necessary in the administration of an estate.

B. University Learning Outcomes

This course enhances student abilities in the following areas:

Communication Skills (written and oral)

Students will prepare legal documents routinely used in wills, trusts and probate. Students will use legal terminology associated with wills, trusts and probate.

Analytical Skills

Critical Thinking Skills- Students will identify the legal issues raised in a case or fact pattern as well as identify the rules that are relied upon to resolve the issues. Students will apply those rules to the issue or fact pattern and reach a logical resolution premised on and grounded in those rules.

Students will demonstrate an understanding of ethical issues inherent in the practice of law regarding wills trusts and probate.
