I. Course Information

A. Catalog Description

Reviews scales, modes, chords, and improvised melodies in jazz, pop, and rock music taught in MUSI 2861. Advanced improvisational techniques and materials are addressed. Ability to read music is required.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Review jazz elements and theory from MUSI 2861 Fundamentals of Improvisation I.
- 2. Perform, dictate and aurally recognize advanced jazz scales and chords.

- 4. Transcribe and analyze an improvised jazz solo from a recorded source.
- 5. Compose and analyze a jazz tune.

- 7. Listen to jazz recordings and aurally recognize form and improvisational devices.
- 8. Discuss and provide examples of how to market your skills as a professional musician, preparing for an audition, preparation and performance considerations for gigs, and other important aspects of being a successful professional musician.
