I. Course Information

A. Catalog Description

Theoretical basis of psychiatric and community health nursing is the focus of the course. Students explore the role of the nurse in the community, in the care of aggregates, and populations at risk. Principles of individual, group and family behaviors will facilitate the study of common psychiatric disorders and their treatment.

B. Additional Information

This course provides a model of nursing service delivery in which "health care" is provided through community diagnosis, health surveillance, and preventive care. Ways to identify major health and environmental problems and to monitor the health status of communities and populations are identified. The goal of creating conditions in which people can be healthy is stressed. Ethical issues that may arise in providing community nursing care are also addressed.

II. Student Learning Outcomes

A. Subject Matter

Upon completion of this course, the student will:

- 1. Utilize **critical thinking** in addressing the care of the client with a psychiatric/mental health disorder and the client in the community.
- 2. Integrate the use of nursing **research** in the care of the client with a psychiatric/mental health disorder and the client in the community.

- 3. Engage in various forms of **communication** to address care of the client with a psychiatric/ mental health disorder and the client in the community.
- 4. Analyze **leadership and management** theories while applying the nursing process to address care of the client with a psychiatric/mental health disorder and the client in the community.
- 5. Incorporate **health promotion** in the nursing care of the client with a psychiatric/mental health disorder and the client in the community.
- 6. Promote the **role of professional nurse** while caring for the client with a psychiatric/mental health disorder and the client in the community.
