## I. Course Information

# A. Catalog Description

The history of Christianity from the birth of Jesus to the close of the first century. Selected passages from the Gospels, Acts, and the Epistles are studied.

## **B.** Additional Information

This course will explore the origins of Christianity and the history of the early Christian Church within the larger context of the Hellenistic Age and the Roman Empire. The primary source material will come from the writings of the New Testament. Other sources to be discussed will include the Dead Sea Scrolls, the Nag Hammadi texts, the Pseudopigrapha, Coptic sources, Josephus, and the writings of the Early Christian Fathers. Archeological evidence will also be examined.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify the early peoples of the Ancient Near East.
- 2. Describe the origins of Christianity.
- 3. Use historical-critical methodology.
- 4. Discuss the cultural influences that shaped Christian theology.
- 5. Analyze how religious texts of contemporary society impacted the evolution of Christianity.
- 6. Compare Biblical records of historical events with archaeological findings.
