## I. Course Information

#### A. Catalog Description

Foundation course in the fundamental Spanish language skills – listening comprehension, speaking, reading, writing, and cultural insight. The emphasis is on communication. (ACTS: SPAN 1013).

### **B.** Additional Information

With the emphasis on communication, this course focuses on students' interpersonal communication, presentational speaking, presentational writing, interpretive listening, and interpretive reading in the target language.

## II. Student Learning Outcomes

#### A. Subject Matter

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Communicate familiar topics using single words and memorized phrases.
- 2. Present information about himself or herself using a variety of memorized words.
- 3. Write lists and memorized phrases on familiar topics.
- 4. Recognize and understand pieces of spoken information related to everyday life.
- 5. Understand familiar words and phrases in simple texts about everyday life.

## **B.** University Learning Outcomes (ULOs)

This course enhances student abilities in the following areas:

## **Analytical Skills**

#### **Critical Thinking Skills**

Students will identify problems/issues and develop solutions/analysis. Students will analyze a variety of texts for their rhetorical and/or literary features, as well as analyze the rhetorical situation to which the texts they produce respond.

# Communication Skills (written and oral)

Students will communicate proficiently. Students will practice communication skills through discussions, presentations, and a variety of required written assignments.

# **Ethical Decision Making**

Students will model ethical decision-making processes. Students will practice critical response to the writing of others, responsible use of research materials and intellectual property, and the ethical use of persuasion.

# **Global & Cultural Perspectives**

Students will reflect upon cultural differences and their implications for interacting with people from cultures other than their own. Students will analyze the rhetorical situation, produce texts for a variety of audiences, and avoid the use of biased language.
