I. Course Information:

A. Catalog Description

A review of Spanish grammar and an introduction to composition as it pertains to descriptions, discussions, hypothetical situations, and past and future tenses.

B. Additional Information

The main goal of this course is to achieve an advanced knowledge of the Spanish grammar. This course will foster the development of students' linguistic skills regarding comprehension and mastery of Spanish. Throughout this course, students will have the opportunity to practice the grammar of the Spanish language. They will review structures already learned and learn further aspects of grammar not yet covered in order to acquire the finer points of Spanish syntax.

II. Student Learning Outcomes

A. Subject Matter

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Distinguish between and use the different tenses.
- 2. Use pronouns in Spanish.
- 3. Use prepositions.
- 4. Use adverbs and adverbial clauses, adjectives and adjectival clauses, and relative clauses.
- 5. Analyze the use of basic grammatical structures in a text and discuss the effect that these structures have on the listener or the reader.
- 6. Edit his/her written texts.

B. University Learning Outcomes (ULOs)

Students will identify problems/issues and develop solutions/analysis. Students will analyze a variety of texts for their rhetorical and/or literary features, as well as analyze the rhetorical situation to which the texts they produce respond.
