Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Define terms related to research methods used in criminal justice studies
- 2. Analyze the underlying epistemology of quantitative and qualitative research
- 3. Discuss the basic principles of quantitative and qualitative research and understand how they are applied in actual research projects
- 4. Design correctly-stated research questions and hypotheses

- 6. Identify the purposes of various statistical tools and select appropriate statistical tools for quantitative, qualitative, and mixed method studies

- 9. Discuss assumptions, limitations, and delimitations for quantitative and qualitative studies
