Provides in-depth study for those seeking to become or enhance their credentials as early childhood administrators in the field of early childhood education. Focuses on topics, early childhood learning standards, and strategies to create a foundation for best practices of leadership in an early childhood center while addressing requirements mandated by state and national early childhood regulations/standards.
